Oakland, California --- A capacity audience and four Boston-area-based Armenian organizations joined with the American University of Armenia in welcoming incoming president Bruce Boghosian and his wife Laura on August 12 at the Armenian Cultural Foundation in Arlington, Mass. Dr. Boghosian be-

comes the University's third presi-dent since its doors opened on the first day of Armenia's indepen-dence in 1991.

an inspiration to other Ameri-can-based organizations to create programs in partnership with AUA. This will benefit not only those in Armenia, but the community here in the United States, as well."

National Association of Armenian Studies and Research chair Raffi Yeghiayan and Haig der Manuelian, president of the Armenian Library and Mu-

seum of America, each speaking for their organizations, summed up the feelings of those in attendance that it
was "very heartwarming to witness the great interest in AUA shown by the
local community and the hope that in future months it will be possible to build on
this interest as AUA enters a new phase and faces new challenges in its growth and development.

President Boghosian described in detail how, with its English-language curriculum and U.S. accreditation, AUA brings the American model of graduate



education to Armenia. Dr. Boghosian presented examples of AUA graduates as leaders in fields as diverse as law. public health and environmental protection, serving as catalysts for attracting investment to Armenia, spurring rural development and expanding Armenia's partici-

pation in the global economy.

AUA today offers American students the opportunity to study in Armenia and earn credits that can be transferred to their home institutions. Graduate students can earn an American-accredited Masters' Degree, while experiencing Armenian culture and developing lifelong friendships with some of the most talented students from the region.
