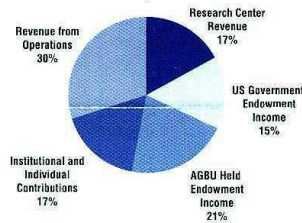

RUNNING AN EFFICIENT OPERATION

The new millennium is not what was expected to be. Global economic down turn. September 11. War. With all this, returns on university endowments are reaching all time lows. Corporations and philanthropic organizations have less to give. And an overall difficult fundraising environment exists. So how does AUA survive with its \$3.1 million operating budget for 2003?

Generosity. The Armenian General Benevolent Union (AGBU), a founding member of AUA, continues to provide major support to AUA, forming 21% of the University's revenue base, while generous individual and institutional contributions amount to 17%. Furthermore, the US Government's Congressional allocation of a \$9.58 million endowment in 1999, provides stability to the budget, with interest income contributing 15% of revenue.

Quality. The AUA leadership has placed priority on the high quality of its educational programs and achievements. New projects or programs are initiated only when they are fiscally sustainable.



Prudence. Over the last two years budget cuts at a rate of 15%-25% have been enforced. Students, faculty and staff have made great sacrifices such as volunteering to receive delayed salary payments and tolerating tuition increases.

Innovation. AUA has begun to raise funds to implement a Student Loan Program, the first of its kind in Armenia, whereby students can borrow up to the full amount of the tuition fees in order to finance their education. With subsidies from AUA, students until now only had to pay approximately \$1000 a year, only 1/6 of the actual \$6000/year tuition. However, economic conditions have compelled AUA in 2003 to substantially increase its tuition revenue, making this loan program an absolute necessity.

SEEKING AN MBA—COME TO AUA

In an era marked with profound changes both in Armenia and in the global marketplace, the ability to adapt to rapid shifts in technology and communications and to manage an ever-changing business environment requires new skills and new attitudes. "My MBA degree from AUA opened wide horizons for my professional development. It gave me the confidence to pursue my career in multinational companies as Johnson &

Johnson and Coca-Cola, where I have been managing the country marketing operations, seeking new products launch opportunities, advertising, etc.," said Karine Sarkissian (MBA '93), Armenia Operations Marketing Manager for Coca-Cola Armenia, Georgia, Eurasia and Middle East Division.

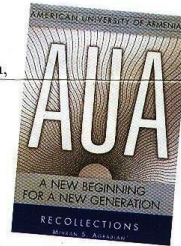

"AUA's MBA program gives an opportunity to get the most current education in one of the most profitable areas—business," said Mikayel Halebyan, first year MBA student, "and I am happy that I can pursue this degree without leaving my homeland."

"Our department continues to enroll some 40 students each year, the highest among all

the AUA departments. This interest is based on the success of about 400 of our graduates who have gone on to occupy key positions in organizations such as HSBC Bank, the Central Bank of Armenia, Amyot LLC, Coca Cola, KPMG, UN, World Bank, and many others," stated Associate Dean and Professor, Dr. Purusottam Sen. "We have a plan to recruit students from the Armenian Diaspora and other students from the region by emphasizing the world class standards of the program."

Dr. Russell Campbell, Dean of AUA's English Programs, passed away on March 30, 2003 following a short battle with a recurrence of cancer. As Founding Dean, Campbell was instrumental in testing AUA's first applicants, developing the Certificate Program in Teaching English as a Foreign Language (TEFL), and later designing the Master's program in TEFL. "Russ was a great leader in managing and projecting the intellectual challenges in Armenia. He had tremendous stature in AUA's excellence and in preparing students for their careers and professional growth," said AUA President, Dr. Haroutune Armenian. "His influence and presence will be sorely missed."

 “**E**mpowered Women” is the project name for the partnership between AUA Extension Programs and the Armenian International Women's Association (AIWA), which sponsored jointly the Women's Entrepreneurship Program, providing course work and training to 18 women to develop small and medium sized businesses. **Gayane Poghosyan**, age 26 and mother of 3, won the \$1000 first place prize for her visionary business plan, “Nine Months,” maternity clothes and accessories company. “The course gave me confidence and a clear vision to turn my idea into the business I am running now,” said Poghosyan.

The program was conceived by **Thelma Tajirian**, Vice-President and Program Manager at Wells Fargo Bank in San Francisco. After a successful pilot project, the curriculum was translated to Armenian, and expanded to Gyumri. “I would like to thank AUA Dean of Extension, **Atken Armenian**, for believing in

the importance of this project. The program could not have succeeded without AUA's support, as AUA provided the compass and the road map to navigate through Armenia,” said Tajirian.

 “**I**f there is one word that accurately describes what libraries need in order to provide innovative services in a highly technological environment, that word is partnership” says **Bella Avakian**, Director of the AUA Papazian Library. “For example, a formal agreement with **Florida Atlantic University (FAU)** allows us to provide full-text delivery and dial-up access to large information databases which we otherwise could not afford.”

The Library supplements its collection through resource sharing and interlibrary lending with libraries in Armenia such as the National Library, the Library of the Academy of Sciences, USIS at the US Embassy and UN Department of Public Information, and World Bank.

In September 2002, the Papazian Library served as a model during a regional workshop sponsored by the American Library Association, **Fostering Civil Society: Improving Access to Information in Academic Libraries in the South Caucasus**. As a member of the Armenian Library Association, the Papazian librarians participate in the professional development of other local librarians, teaching courses that provide new cataloging and classification standards in electronic formats, as well as techniques in information retrieval.

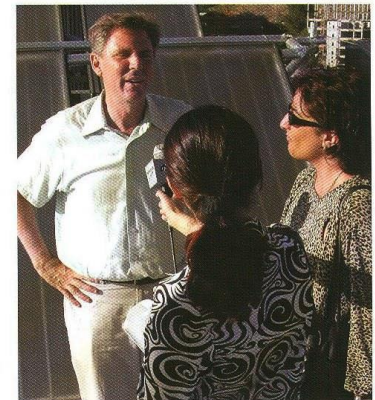

AUA's Engineering Research Center (ERC) is at the forefront of applying innovative alternative sources of energy among the countries of the former Soviet Union. Scientists in Portugal, Germany, Russia and Armenia collaborated to complete a three year solar energy project called **DESODEC**, funded by INCO Copernicus of the European Union and Mr. **Sarkis Acopian**, to provide a solar based heating and cooling system for AUA's Small Auditorium using new solar technology. Through a generous contribution from the **Turpanjian Family Foundation**, work has just begun on design and installation of a solar photovoltaic system, utilizing new ‘know-how’ in the solar energy field.

ERC is also working with two local companies successfully operating in alternative energy, **SolarEn** and **H₂ ECOnomy**. “These collaborative projects are attractive because AUA students have the opportunity to complete internships in H₂ ECOnomy, the only company in Armenia which researches, develops, manufactures and assembles PEM Fuel Cells” said **Artak Hambaryan**, Associate Director of the College of Engineering. AUA graduate,

Mardit Matian commented that he became more familiar with fuel cell technology, team work and preparing a business plan during his internship at H₂ ECOnomy. “Most important, I learned how to translate knowledge from my AUA education into practice,” said Matian.

PUBLIC HEALTH COURSE GOES ONLINE

AUA's Center for Health Services Research and Development (CHSR) delivered a free web-based distance learning public health course in Armenian, Russian, and English, targeting health professionals throughout the region. "The 'Basics of Health Planning' course was funded by the Open Society Institute, and designed to present the fundamental concepts, principles and methods of health planning," said CHSR Project Manager, Tsovinar Harutyunyan.

Participants learned about setting objectives, monitoring performance, budgeting, and health personnel management, while the course raised public interest in distance learning and training in the field of public health. "The large number of registered students and good completion rates exceeded all of our expectations, indicating a high demand for such courses in Armenia," continued Harutyunyan.
