PROMOTING THE RULE OF LAW

The AUA Law Department, an affiliate of the University of California's Boalt Hall School of Law at Berkeley, has graduated 73 students since its founding in 1996. These alumni contribute to strengthening Armenia's commitment to the rule of law, as well as Armenia's economy and its place in the international community. "Whether it's Albina Nazaryan (MCLS '01), who is Head of the Trademark and Industrial Design

department of Armenia's Intellectual Property Agency, Judge Astghik Kharatyan (LLM '98) in the Court of Appeals, or Artashes Kakoyan (LLM '98), who started his own business, Investment Law Group LLC, our graduates are in positions which help steer Armenia to become a stronger democratic nation," stated Stephen Barnett, Dean of the AUA Law Department and Professor Emeritus at Boalt Hall.

The law program is focused on teaching the Rule of Law and the Western Legal Tradition, in addition to business law, international law, and clinical legal skills. The department awards two degrees, the Master of Laws (LLM) to students whose prior degree is in law, and the Master of Comparative Legal Studies (MCLS) to students whose prior degree is in another subject.

"This past year, our students have taken their interest in protecting human rights to

the next level," said Associate Dean Matthew Karanian. "With partial funding from the United States Embassy, our law students established the Shitak Human Rights Group, an official non-governmental organization, now registered in Armenia," he added. Shitak has created a law review which it publishes on the Internet at www.armlawreview.org. The website contains articles on current developments in human

rights. Dean Barnett describes the work of these students as "a significant accomplishment, establishing AUA's role as a vital force in promoting public understanding, debate, and resolution of the legal issues facing Armenia and its region today."

"Work on Shitak enables me not only to make my modest input in the process of establishing human rights values, by raising public awareness and running a website, but also has helped me to develop my organizational and team work skills, and creativity," noted Mariam

Badalyan (MCLS '04). AUA's law students have produced public forums on issues important to Armenia's law, government, and society today. In 2004, they produced conferences on Environmental Law, Military Service, Trafficking in Humans, and Armenia's Anti-Corruption efforts, with speakers representing a variety of constituencies and points of view.

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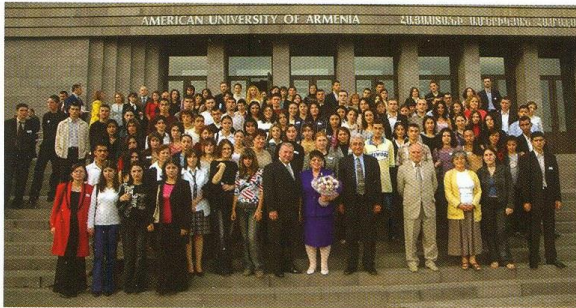
A NEW BEGINNING FOR A NEW GENERATION

AUA celebrated its 11th graduation and commencement ceremonies in October 2004. One hundred and thirty three motivated and ambitious men and women walked down the aisle to receive their Master's Degrees. These new graduates join AUA's 1,136 alumni who now occupy important leadership positions. Approximately 75% of 1,136 graduates reside in Armenia, 19% are working abroad, and 6% are pursuing higher education abroad.

Alumni working in Armenia are employed by international non-profit organizations (27%), local private organizations (22%), joint-ventures (15%), local state and governmental organizations (12%), foreign governmental organizations (12%), and foreign and international private organizations (12%).

Zaven Kodjayan (1937-2002) lived and died with one great regret – he was never afforded the opportunity to complete his education. "Zaven would wish for a young person to be given

the gift of an education that he so greatly desired for himself," stated his wife, Mrs. Rhonda Kodjayan. In his memory, the Kodjayan family established the Zaven O. Kodjayan Scholarship Fund at the American University of Armenia to assist qualified students in their pursuit of higher education.

The San Francisco-Oakland AGBU chapter, in conjunction with the St. John Armenian Church of San Francisco, organized a public forum in San Francisco earlier this year. Generous gifts were made for the support of the AUA Law Department. "The partnership between the AGBU and AUA is very important and we are proud to support this University as it participates in the development of Armenia," noted AGBU San Francisco-Oakland Chair, Mrs. Ashken Mouradian.

AUA is now on a critical path to develop a successful regional and international student recruitment campaign. In 2004, the United States Embassy provided funding to AUA to develop administrative structures and services necessary to implement an international student recruitment effort, and USAID's American Schools and Hospitals Abroad (ASHA) provided grant funding to establish student housing.

AUA has relied upon the United Armenia Fund (UAF) for the last 13 years to ship free of charge several million dollars worth of educational resources, technological equipment, and other materials essential to the advancement of the University. Thank you UAF! Thus far, UAF has shipped \$391 million worth of supplies to Armenia on board 130 airlifts and 1,100 sea shipments over the last 15 years.

During graduation week, AUA dedicated the Stepan Karamardian Conference Hall in the AUA Business and Conference Center. During this occasion, Mrs. Seta Karamardian announced that the Karamardian family will establish an annual scholarship in AUA Founding Member Dr. Stepan Karamardian's name, to assist a deserving student in AUA's School of Business and Management

Sebough Hatsakordzian and Mardit Matian did just that. Both are graduates of AUA's School of Engineering and work in the ever-expanding high-tech industry in Armenia.

"With one semester left to graduate from Haigazian University in Beirut, I visited Armenia for the first time in 1997 and went to AUA," said Sebough Hatsakordzian (pictured right).

"After learning more from an AUA recruiter visiting Beirut, I applied in 2001 and graduated in October 2003." In similar fashion, Mardit Matian (pictured left), who is from Tehran, learned about AUA when he was in Armenia for the first time with his parents.

As an AUA student, Matian completed an internship with H₂ ECoNomy, which researches, develops and manufactures fuel cell stacks. "Since I was a mechanical



engineer and interested in designing and manufacturing, I worked in AUA's CAD/CAM laboratory as a research assistant where I improved my skills," noted

Matian. After graduation, he was hired at H₂ ECoNomy, a small American-Armenian company involved in the development of technology to transform hydrogen and oxygen into electricity. The successful company already employs several AUA alumni.

Sebough Hatsakordzian works for HPLA LLC, an Armenia based subsidiary of HPL Technologies and a leading provider of yield optimization solutions for the semiconductor and flat panel display industries. "AUA brings foreign professors and experts that come and share with us their experience. AUA graduates are trained to think openly, diversely, and ready to absorb new suggestions and systems," says Hatsakordzian. He lives in Yerevan with his wife, Dzovinar Bedrossian, who is a student in AUA's Department of English Programs.
