# ABOUT AUA EXTENSION

AUA Extension is the nation's largest and probably the world's smallest single-campus continuing educational program, enrolling upwards of 1,500 participants annually. Not yet as an entirely self-supporting not-for-profit division of AUA. Extension advances the interconnected assigned missions of the American University of Armenia Corporation (AUAC) that is an affiliate of the University of California, The Armenian General Benevolent Union (AGBU), and the Ministry of Higher Education and Science of the Republic of Armenia.

In endeavoring to bring the resources of the University to community life, Extension's work has been linked primarily to AUA's commitment to public service. Since opening its door at AUA in September 1992, Extension has responded to its public service commitment through a variety of programs, courses, and special events designed to improve the economic, intellectual, and socially responsive competencies of Armenia's citizenry.

Extension programs offer concentrated study in areas directly applicable to many jobs and can add breadth and depth to existing knowledge and skills. People enroll in these programs to:

- . Acquire extensive practical background and skills
- . Justify promotion
- . Facilitate career change
- . Provide meaningful documentation noting formal education in a specific field
- . Benefit from the discipline of working toward a goal
- . Examine a new field

Most programs do not require a university or college degree. Many programs include special introductory courses for students at a beginning level; advance classes usually have prerequisites which supply the necessary background information. Most courses are offered in the evenings; however, some programs do provide weekend and daytime schedules for flexibility. The application fee for enrolling in the programs varies. Costs of the program include application fee and course enrollment fee that does not exceed 100 Trams. In most cases the fees are waived since the average wage being 250 Tram/month, participants do not have the luxury to splurge on education. The language of instruction is English, with simultaneous translation provided.

Working out of two adjacent offices on the fifth floor of AUA's 40 Marshall Bagramiam campus, Extension staff is comprised of an Administrator, an Administrative Assistant, a Secretary and two student assistants. Here, at Extension, we get our best laughs when we are reminded (especially when fighting over the use of the small auditorium which is equipped with simultaneous translation facilities) by colleagues in Degree Programs that Extension is not as important as the Degree programs. We call this "Extension Envy". Humor counts.

On a typical work day, minus such accidental remarks, Extension receives on the average 60 phone calls and 15-20 visitors.

When asked "What is your vision for the 90's", I respond humorously, "I am not a visionary. I am a dreamer and I have fantasies." It is my fantasy, that in a few years, when AUA moves to its future campus site in the Nork region, Extension expands within 40 Marshall Bagramian, making it's services even more accessible to the population of the city of Yerevan. We are excited about our next 1000 years (afterall, for a nation 4000 years old, this kind of exaggeration is permissible). The technological advances of recent years are revolutionizing education, and we look forward to providing the highest quality of instruction in the formats that best serve Armenia's educational goals.

### CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN PUBLIC POLICY AND MANAGEMENT

### Purpose:

The purpose of the Certificate Program is to provide the students with a wide range of skills for responsible positions in national, regional and city governments. Emphasis is on analytical and communication skills, policy-making processes, and management technology.

### Outline of Curriculum:

(This curriculum is based on the course offerings in Public Policy and Management at the University of Southern California)

- 1. Public Organizations and Management
- 2. Public Policy Processes and Institutions
- 3. Government and Business
- 4. Citizenship and Public Ethics
- 5. Simulated Policy Making and Management
- 6. Public Policy and Management Issues and Practices (project assignment)

## Scope of the Training Program:

This is a three term program (each term consists of ten weeks). It is a modular program. A student may register for one, two, or three terms. Topics 1 and 2 were offered in the first term, topics 4 and 5 were offered in the second term, and topics 3 and 6 are being offered in the third term. The student receives a Certificate at the end of each term, if he/she does not continue beyond that term. The end of term Certificates mention that the student has successfully completed the two courses. Those who complete the entire three term course receive a Certificate that states that they have completed a One Year program in Public Policy and Management.

### Students:

Students enrolled are middle management employees of government agencies or recent graduates from the State University of Yerevan or the National Economics Institute that offer the equivalent of a B.S. degree. Basic knowledge of English is required. Simultaneous translation is provided. 44 students were registered for the first term. 45 students were registered for the second term. 21 students were registered for the third term.

Current Issues in Armenia:

The Certificate Program addresses current issues in Armenia while at the same time emphasizing fundamental concepts in Public Policy and Management. Here are some of the issues:

- a) Human resources: Personnel problems in Armenia are mostly unresolved since the collapse of the Soviet Union. Compensation, work schedules, output and efficiency, delegation of responsibilities, administration of personnel are all in a crisis situation. Management skills in utilization of human resources is an important topic.
- b) Policy decisions: Major policy decisions are very slow in happening. The members and staff of the Parliament have communication skills but very little experience in putting into practice ideas discussed in public. Case studies are emphasized. Invited lecturers from local agencies detail the as yet unresolved problem, and faculty and students work on alternative solutions. Examples of unresolved issues are: budgeting for science and technology programs; health care reorganization and management; role of non-profit organizations; career planning and development for graduating seniors from State universities; urban social issues; relationship of national and local government.
- c) Contract theory and law: Armenia has yet to attract investors and business ventures for the economic improvement of the country. Ideas abound, but foreign businessmen return frustrated at the inability of local government agencies to handle issues in contract requirements, specifications, performance evaluation, disputes, and general definition of responsibilities.

### Faculty:

Guest faculty from the United States (and Europe) provide the main leadership. Local participating lecturers are persons in agencies who bring their expertise in discussing current problems for case evaluation purposes.

### CERTIFICATE PROGRAM IN PUBLIC HEALTH

AUA is initiating a one-year Certificate program in Public Health that will provide health professionals with a background preparation for roles in the public health sector. Emphasis will be on personal skills in basic public health sciences, including planning, evaluation, management, communication, epidemiology and leadership. Applicants must be either graduates of a school of medicine, dentistry or veterinary medicine or hold a baccalaureate degree in engineering, natural or social sciences or related fields, and have at least two years of practical work experience in health care administration or public health service.

## Projected program:

- . The program will be very closely linked with the Ministry of Health and will develop leadership in health manpower.
- . The curriculum will be modular and each of the modules will integrate an area that is essential for public health practice. These modules could be used for continuing education or re-education.
- The program will start in the fall and include a six month program of English and computer skills. The first public health module in the spring will focus on ecological and behavioral sciences, the second (summer) will provide biostatistics, epidemiology and information sciences, and the third (fall module) will be the health policy and management module. If the fund raising activities are successful then a second year of professional training will be appended to this program.

# Admissions requirements:

Admissions requirements include a 4.0 or higher comulative grade point average and either a TOEFL score above 550 or successful completion of a English qualifying examination to be given at AUA. Passage of a Graduate Record Examination (GRE), to be given by AUA each December, also is required. For candidates who do not meet the stated English proficiency requirements, an Intensive English Program will be offered in the Fall Quarter, 1994.

Final selection of students admitted to the Certificate program will be made in February, 1995. The Program will accept a maximum of 20 students.

## TRAINING PROGRAMS

U.S. TRAINING PROGRAM FOR ARMENIAN GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS IN INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS AND GOVERNMENT FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

Funded by USIA, the program was developed to serve the needs of Yerevan government officials. The program concentrated on providing carefully selected local and regional government officials in Yerevan with a basic understanding of the principles and practices in the area of intergovernmental relations and delineation of authority and responsibility among the national, regional, and local levels of government. It also focused on government financial management. Integrally related, these two areas were fundamental to effective government in the democratic, decentralized, market-based system that Armenians are working to achieve.

Phase I (October 31 - November 25, 1992) of the program consisted of preparation for and implementation of two-week workshops in the two program areas. Five experts arrived from the U.S. to conduct the workshops. The workshops were attended by 35 government officials.

Phase II (February 3 - March 12, 1993) of the program consisted of preparation for and implementation of a two-week study trip to the U.S. for thirteen officials (three higher level officials), and a six-week internships for ten officials. In addition, this phase included an intensive two-week English language training program for the participants.

Phase III (July 9 - July 29, 1993) focused on assisting the participants in implementing new ideas and programs stemming from the first two phases. The program consisted of a two-day project implementation workshop and individual office consultations for each of the participants. The two-day workshop focused on familiarizing the participants with implementation techniques such as problem solving, brainstorming, force-field analysis, change management, conducting effective meetings, and management styles.

In all phases of the program, the Extension office extended logistial support, evaluated applications and made recommendations, interviewed participants, and hosted the program on University grounds.
